### 2025 Federal Elections:

**Who is eligible to vote in the federal election?**

You may vote in this federal election if you:

- are a Canadian citizen
- will be 18 or older on election day
- [are registered to vote](#)

**How do I register to vote?**

1. [Register online](#) using the [Online Voter Registration Service](#):
  - You will need to provide the number on your driver's licence or upload the accepted identification document(s).
2. Register by mail (outside a general election or by-election) — [Contact us](#) to request a registration form. We'll send the form by mail, e-mail or fax. Complete the form, sign it and return it by mail, along with a copy of your proof of identity and address.

After an election is called, you can also register at your local Elections Canada office or at your polling place when you go to vote

## SORTING REQUIREMENTS FOR LANDFILLS

### House hold

house hold garbage  
 Cement – cement blocks,  
 large chunks of broken cement  
 plastic, glass,  
 Shingles, insulation, drywall  
 all household furniture i.e. treated,  
 painted, stained or upholstered  
 furniture  
 Plywood – OSB, press board, MDF  
 board (anything that contains a glue  
 product)  
 Treated Construction Lumber – 2x4's  
 etc.  
 EMPTY paint & aerosol cans  
 EMPTY – CLEAN oil containers

**Creosoted Wood, railway ties, bridge timbers MUST be taken to the Richardson Landfill ONLY (for a fee)**

### Tires

must be reported to dump attendant & *tire drop off ticket* is to be completed  
tires must be placed in tire pile

### Propane Tanks

must be *completely* empty & put in a separate area beside the metal

### Electronics

TV's, computers, printers, tablets etc. to be placed in the electronic bin

### Burnable

clean wood – tree branches, limbs & leaves  
NON-TREATED construction wood, pallets, wood crates, cardboard

### Ashes

must be cold *NO HOT COALS* must be dumped in the ash pile

### Wire

page wire, barbed wire, cables to be rolled & put in a separate area beside the metal pile

### Metal

all metals  
vehicles & their metal parts  
air conditioners – including portable, central air units  
freezers, refrigerators  
ALL MUST BE TAGGED BY A QUALIFIED TECHNICIAN



### WE WILL NOT ACCEPT

- new or used oil i.e. motor oil, hydraulic oil etc. - dirty oil containers or their lids (they must be clean), - used oil filters
- no fuel or oil tanks unless they are clean and dry
- paint cans/aerosol cans that have paint in them – must be empty or the paint must be dry/solid - air conditioners/appliances with Freon

Together, these partners work to ensure Canadians receive alerts immediately and know when to take action to stay safe.

# CARBON MONOXIDE CAN BE DEADLY!

Over **65%** of all carbon monoxide deaths and injuries in Ontario occur in **homes**.

**Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning** Carbon monoxide can cause health problems before you even notice that it is present. Breathing it in reduces your body's ability to carry oxygen in your blood. Exposure to the gas can cause carbon monoxide poisoning (CO poisoning) and can be dangerous to your health.

**At Low Levels, effects include flu-like symptoms:** tiredness, headaches, shortness of breath, impaired motor functions, such as: muscle weakness or partial or total loss of function of a body part (limb or limbs)

**At High Levels or if you are exposed to low levels for long periods of time, you can experience:**

dizziness, chest pain, poor vision, difficult thinking **At VERY High Levels:** convulsions, coma, or death.

**Preventing carbon monoxide poisoning** Keep your home and cottage air clean and free of carbon monoxide by: - preventing indoor smoking, keeping the door between your house and the garage closed, not idling vehicles in the garage, even when the garage door is open.

### Regular appliance maintenance and inspections

Ensure appliances are well maintained and inspected

by a professional at least one a year. This should include furnaces, fireplaces, gas stoves & water heaters. **Regularly examine** propane & natural gas-powered appliances, such as: stoves, heaters & refrigerators. **Check for:** leaks, cracks, blocked vents, improper installations, poor connections of gas lines to appliances & vents, breaks or tears in connections tubes, corroded or disconnected venting pipes.

**Inspect exhaust vents during and after a snowstorm to make sure they are not covered with snow.**

Do this for your dryer, furnace, fireplace & chimney heat recovery ventilator and wood-burning or gas stove. **INSTALL AT LEAST ONE CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS** in addition to your smoke alarm. Your smoke alarm will NOT warn you of high carbon monoxide levels in your home. **TEST CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS REGULARLY** replace batteries and the alarm itself as recommended by the manufacturer. If your alarm sounds leave your home immediately, once outside call 9-1-1. Return to your home **ONLY AFTER** the problem has been fixed by a professional. **For more information**

**contact your local fire department.**

### NEVER use:

- gas powered machines in the garage, such as: trimmers, generators, lawnmowers, snowblowers, bar-b-ques or portable fuel-burning camping equipment inside a home, garage, vehicle, camper or tent, kerosene or oil space heaters and lamps in enclosed areas unless they are specifically designed for indoor use.
